

Earnings and unemployment rates by educational attainment, 2020





Share of Workers Unemployed by Education Level


Higher educational attainment is associated with lower unemployment rates.


Earnings inequalities persist after credential attainment.



Texas Context

Adult Education and Literacy (AEL) programs are managed by the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC).

The governor of Texas has initiated a statewide triagency workforce initiative that includes the Texas Workforce Commission, the Texas Education Agency, and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

 Over half of the nearly 1.7 million students in higher education in Texas are enrolled in community colleges. Texas needs to support community college students to meet 60x30TX goals.


 With more than 80,000 students enrolled in AEL programs statewide, community colleges must also provide viable pathways for AEL students to attain postsecondary credentials to meet goals.




Essential Pathways Practices



Building AEL to Community College Pathways

Lessons Learned

Findings from the Texas Pathways and Texas Peer Mentor Network collaboration

- 1. Texas community colleges and AEL providers are working to create viable pathways for AEL completers, but there is still work to be done.
- Opportunities exist to address silos within and across institutions.
- 3. Information barriers exist, such as:
 - Understanding AEL innovations across the state
 - Understanding higher education systems and reform efforts
 - Navigating funding structures and options for student support
- 4. Engaging community college CEOs is imperative to systematic change
- 5. Engaging the state tri-agency partnership is necessary





Building AEL to Community College Pathways

Recommendations

Charge a leadership team with integration.

- Career Navigators, Tutors, Advisors, Mentors



Align program offerings.

- 1. Use the TX-PMN Tenets to design and align AEL and college programs.
- 2. Develop coherent program maps from AEL programs to Texas Pathways programs aligned to community college meta-majors.
- **3. Streamline college readiness assessments** for AEL completers transitioning to college-level programs.
- **4. Integrate** AEL students and program information into community college systems.
- **5. Mirror** AEL content courses with credit-bearing college-level courses, including an AEL and credit-bearing college-level Learning Framework course.



Accelerate transitions to college-level programs.

- 1. Systematically inspect transition points, **identify and remove barriers**, simplify enrollment processes.
- 2. Enact placement policies using **multiple measures of readiness** to ensure college-ready students have access to credit-bearing coursework, and students needing support have access to appropriate corequisite supports.
- 3. Design clear and consistent **student-facing messaging.**
- 4. Develop a **transition experience or orientation** prior to start of the college program to introduce AEL completers to college life.
- 5. Support **student service partnerships** between AEL Career Navigators and college staff to provide wraparound support services.

Explore funding options.

Explore a variety of existing funding options to:

- 1. Encourage AEL completers to continue to a stackable credential.
- 2. Offset the cost of developmental education.
- 3. Ensure all students have access to aid.

Funding options in Texas include:

- Jobs & Education for Texans (JET) grants defray start-up costs associated with the development of career and technical education programs
- Ability to Benefit (ATB) funds certain AEL students without a high school diploma or equivalency
- Skills Development Fund (SDF) grants from TWC support business programs



Seek continual improvement.

- 1. Engage AEL faculty in professional development led by college partners to understand how to prepare AEL students for success in community college programs.
- 2. Engage college faculty in professional development led by AEL partners to be able to recognize and address the challenges faced by AEL students as they navigate Pathways.
- 3. Participate in healthy college-to-college mentoring.
- 4. Communicate new program initiatives and **broadcast student success stories** to highlight innovative changes.
- **5. Collect and share data** to monitor, reflect, and adjust program alignment for student success.



Integrating AEL and community college programs is not just another new initiative,

but a new way to think about who we are becoming together:

changed organizations that are systematically better at serving students.
