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



# WIOA TITLE I

Workforce Development Activities

### WIOA Title I Workforce Development Activities

Title I of WIOA authorizes programs that help individuals find jobs and improve their employment prospects through education, and training activities.

It also establishes the One-Stop delivery system - americanjobcenter aka Workforce Solution Offices.

### TITLE I ELIGIBILITY ADULT

- $\geq 18$  years old.
- US citizen or resident eligible to work in the US.
- Males  $\geq$  18 registered for military selective services.
- Social Security number.
- Annual family income  $\leq 100\%$  of the poverty line, or 70% lower living standard.
- Meet exceptions to income test (e.g., receiving public assistance, homeless, free/reduced-price lunch).

#### TITLE I ELIGIBILITY DISLOCATED WORKER

Individuals who have been laid off, received termination notices, are selfemployed but jobless due to economic factors, are spouses of active-duty military personnel unemployed after relocating for permanent duty reassignment, or are displaced homemakers.

- $\geq$  18 years old.
- Social Security number.
- Annual family income  $\leq 100\%$  of the poverty line, or 70% lower living standard.
- Meet exceptions to income test (e.g., receiving public assistance, homeless, free/reduced-price lunch).
- Note: A displaced homemaker is often a former stay-at-home parent struggling to find well-paying work after divorce or loss of spousal support.

#### TITLE I ELIGIBILITY IN-SCHOOL YOUTH (ISY)

#### In-School Youth:

• 14–21 years old.

WIQA

- Enrolled in school (secondary or PSE).
- Citizen or resident eligible to work in the US.
- Males ≥ 18 registered for military selective services.
- Low income or lives in a highpoverty area.
- Meet at least one eligibility barrier.

#### **Eligibility Barriers**:

- Basic skills deficient (≤8th grade level on a standardized test).
- English Language Learner with limited proficiency or resides in a family or community where a language other than English is predominantly spoken.
- Homeless, runaway, foster care or aged out of foster care, eligible for Social Security assistance, or an out-of-home placement.
- Pregnant or parenting, disabled, justice involved.
- Requires additional assistance to complete educational program or secure/hold employment.

## TITLE I ELIGIBILITY OUT-OF-SCHOOL YOUTH (OSY)

#### Out-of-School Youth:

WIQA

- 16-24 years old.
- Citizen or resident eligible to work in US.
- Males ≥ 18 registered for military selective services.
- NOT enrolled in school.
- Low income or lives in a highpoverty area.
- Meet at least one eligibility barrier.

#### Eligibility Barriers:

- School dropout (19-24 years old), as defined by the state.
- Between 16-18 years old, have not earned an HSD/HSE, and absent for 3 consecutive months.
- Basic skills deficient (≤8<sup>th</sup> Grade) or lack English proficiency despite having an HSD/HSE.
- Homeless, runaway, foster care or aged out of foster care, eligible for Social Security assistance, or an out-of-home placement.
- Pregnant or parenting, disabled, justice-involved.
- Requires additional assistance.

## **TITLE I Workforce Development Activities** 14 WIOA YOUTH ELEMENTS/SERVICES are designed to support youth in gaining the skills and experience needed for successful careers.

- 1. Tutoring, study skills, instruction, drop-out prevention
- 2. Alternative secondary school or drop-out recovery services
- 3. Paid/unpaid work experiences
- 4. Occupational skills training
- 5. Contextualized education, occupational training, workforce preparation offered concurrently
- 6. Leadership development opportunities

- 7. Supportive services
- 8. Adult mentoring
- 9. Follow-up services
- 10. Comprehensive guidance/counseling
- 11. Financial literacy education
- 12. Entrepreneurial skills training
- 13. Labor market information services
- 14. Post-secondary preparation/transition activities

# WIOA TITLE II

Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA)

### WIOA Title II Adult Education and Family Literacy Act

AELFA provides states with funding for a variety of services to help adults develop basic skills (e.g., reading, writing, math, English language acquisition), transition to postsecondary education and training, and gain employment.



# TITLE II ELIGIBILITY

- 16 Years Old: Court Order required.
- ≥ 17-18: Not enrolled in school AND without an HSD/HSE require one of the following:
  - Court Order
  - Parent/Guardian permission on enrollment form. <u>Must attempt to get permission</u> <u>first! If unavailable:</u>
    - Proof or student self-attestation of living separately from parent/guardian
    - Proof and/or student self-attestation of homelessness
- ≥19:
  - Basic-skills deficient (functioning below HS graduate level)
  - No HSD/HSE
  - English Language Learner

# TITLE II Support Services

Removing barriers, improving lives, and enabling long-term employment success and self-sufficiency.

- Transportation assistance.
- Integrated Education and Training (IET)
  - Low-cost or no-cost.
- Work-place Training.
- Holistic support services, including career counseling, job search assistance, and other support, are provided through collaboration with other WIOA Titles.

# WIOA TITLE III

Amendments to the Wagner-Peyser Act

### WIOA Title III Wagner-Peyser Act (Employment Service)

The Wagner-Peyser Act of 1933, established a nationwide system of public employment offices, known as the Employment Service.

Employment-related services are designed to increase employment opportunities for all workers and meet the needs of businesses with work-ready job seekers.



- 14 years of age or older at the time of enrollment in the program;
- A US citizen or a noncitizen authorized to work in the US; and
- Compliant with the United States Selective Service System registration requirements (if male).

Amendments to the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

#### WIOA Title IV Vocational Rehabilitation Services


Help eligible customers gain, maintain, or advance in employment and secure financial and personal independence through rehabilitative services.

# WIOA TITLE IV ELIGIBILITY

Individuals <u>may</u> qualify for Vocational Rehabilitation services if they have a condition (diagnosed or not) that creates barriers to employment.

- Behavioral and mental health conditions
- Hearing impairments, including deafness
- Alcoholism or drug addiction
- Intellectual, learning and developmental disabilities
- Physical disabilities, including traumatic brain and spinal cord injury, back injury, paralysis and impaired movement
- Visual impairments

# TITLE IV Support Services

Title IV funds a wide array of services tailored to individual needs and goals. These can include:

- Assistive Technology: Providing and training on assistive technology devices and services to enable individuals to work.
- Supported Employment: Providing ongoing support services to individuals with disabilities to help them maintain employment.
- Independent Living Services: Connecting individuals with services that promote independent living and community integration.
